

# EXAMPLE OF WORSHIP TEAM REHEARSAL

To maximize your chance of having a great rehearsal, be sure to get the set list and song sheets out 1 week to 1 month prior to the rehearsal, and communicate all expectations in advance.

7:00pm	<p><b>Practice on Stage</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Talk through each song, highlighting specific musical parts / expectations</li> <li>• Play through each song, stopping to address problem areas</li> </ul>	<p><b>Practice off Stage</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Talk through each song, highlighting specific vocal parts / expectations</li> <li>• Play through each song, stopping to address problem areas</li> </ul>
7:45pm	<p><b>5 Minute Break</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• To make the most out of your time together, and to love your team well, give them a chance to take a quick break, catch their breath, or even just engage in some small talk</li> </ul>	
7:50pm	<p><b>Devotional / Prayer Time</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• This is a great / natural opportunity to spend some time growing together relationally and spiritually</li> <li>• Placing this moment in the middle of rehearsal, after a quick break, with a clearly defined start and stop time, will maximize the effectiveness and promote the most engagement from the team</li> </ul>	
8:00pm	<p><b>Full Rehearsal</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Play through the full set, beginning to end, as if it is the actual church service</li> <li>• DO NOT stop to address issues / missed cues, at any point, unless you just absolutely cannot move forward</li> </ul>	
8:30pm	<p><b>End Rehearsal</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Be sure to honor your worship team by ending on time</li> </ul>
